Almost ninety Retired Staff Association members and partners descended (or should that be ascended for southerners?) on the Grosvenor Hotel at Pulford on the outskirts of Chester last month, for the 2018 AGM and a social weekend that also included a celebration of the RSA's 40th anniversary.

The event was hosted by the indefatigable Ted Tilly and Phil Holt, ably assisted by Andy Maynard and other members of the RSA North-West Branch. In a 'first' for the RSA, the event was supported by Fred Olsen Lines and we are most grateful for their contribution. Their excellent display and publicity material attracted plenty of attention from RSA members and I hope that we will be seeing them again in the future.

As the arrangement had worked well in recent years, RSA 18 – as the 2018 AGM is known - took place on the Friday afternoon, leaving the weekend free for members and partners to enjoy the social programme, arranged for us by the organisers, before returning home.

Anne noted that Branch support was continuing to prove difficult, with Western Home Counties following Eastern Branch into the arms of London (now London & Home Counties) Branch. In Scotland, Highlands & Islands and West of Scotland – both inactive – were now reporting to the Edinburgh Branch.

During the year, Andy Maynard had spent much time and effort revitalising the Travel Club, which now offers RSA members a wide range of travel discounts. Andy has also established Facebook and Twitter accounts for the RSA, so we can now boast a 'social media' presence!

Treasurer Matthew Baines noted that although RSA membership had declined slightly (to 5022), the finances had improved, with a slightly higher percentage of members paying regular subscriptions. New members were encouraged to join RSA through pre-retirement presentations to NATS staff, and by letter to CAA staff, as the CAA no longer provided pre-retirement courses.

In discussion, members guestioned the need for the RSA's financial reserves, and requested additional funding for the remaining active branches. Colin Chisholm, our Member Nominated Director on the Pension Scheme Board, defended the reserves and said that we needed a healthy balance in order to obtain legal advice against potential threats from employers or government, that could impact RSA pensioners. Colin's view was supported by Matthew and other members and strongly endorsed by our Vice President Leslie Priestley. Matthew then added - in response to the original question that the RSA Central Committee had reviewed the level of Branch grants and agreed to further reviews in the future.

After further discussion, and approval of a revised Constitution, the meeting closed. And then the fun began...

We were staying in fine style: the Grosvenor Pulford Hotel is a handsome old building, constructed out of the local dark red sandstone. Formerly owned by Lord Nelson's descendants, it is now undergoing a £2 million refurbishment and extension programme - which made for some interesting journeys between the bedrooms and reception areas! Pulford itself is almost an 'estate village', situated on the edge of the Duke of Westminster's vast Eaton Hall estate, which stretches from the outskirts of Chester to the Welsh border. As a result of the family's name, almost anything in the area that could possibly be named is 'Grosvenor' something-or-other!

Our Friday evening began with an informal drinks reception, followed by a lavish buffet dinner in (you've guessed it) The Grosvenor Suite. Welcome to the 2018 "All Members" edition of "Contrail". This post AGM issue is jam packed with not only reports from the RSA 18 AGM weekend, but also

I am a member of the Patient and **Client Council for Northern Ireland** and came across an interest fact in one of their recent blogs. David Gordon the Department of Health's **Director of Communications stated** "The Bengoa report (a recent report into the future of health care in Northern Ireland) noted bluntly: "In terms of costs, users aged over 65 account for more than two-fifths of HSC (Health and Social Care) spending – 42%, compared to their population share of 14%. Whereas the average cost of treating a 55-59 vear old stands at £1,970 per head. this rises to over £6.000 for 75-79 vear olds and £14.000 for the over 85's." What the report, and David Gordon, failed to point out was the fact that, in general, those over 65 have financially contributed more during their lives than other age groups.

RSA 18 Cont'd

The evening ended with what must be called the "Ted and Phil Show'. I can't think how Elvis came into it, but thanks to Ted, he certainly did – and to great effect! I don't know who writes their lines, but it was a great evening. Thankyou Ted and Phil.

We split up into two groups on Saturday, mine starting with a bus trip into the city centre to board our first outing of the day: a trip around the city on a 1915 open-top 'B' Type London bus. The bus-spotters amongst us (and we know who you are...) will recall that the 'B' Type bus became famous during World War One, taking our troops to the Front Line. (This one was originally built in 1964 as a single-deck Bedford coach for Wessex Coaches in Bristol. It was re-designed and re-built in 1982 by E. L. Farrar in St Austell, Cornwall and fitted with the present body, a hand-built replica of a London General Omnibus B-Type motorbus - Ed.) The more anxious of us were reassured to hear that the bus is fitted with a modern engine and brakes. We had an excellent guide, who pointed out in the Middle Ages, Chester was an important port – until the River Dee silted up!

A curious feature of the city is the blank wall on clock towers facing towards Wales: Chester had been raided by the Welsh so often over the centuries that the townspeople hated their Welsh neighbours, and left the welsh-facing clock towers blank in order to deprive their neighbours of the time of day. The origin – so our guide explained – of the phrase "Not giving them the time of day". I'm just telling you. Don't shoot the messenger.

The centre of Chester is famous for its 'Rows' – medieval shops with galleried walkways on the first floor, enabling shoppers to perambulate without getting wet during showers. They're unique in England, their nearest equivalent being the "bastide" fortified towns of southern France.

In the afternoon, we boarded a coach for a trip on the Llangollen Canal. Used these days almost entirely for pleasure travel, the canal was originally planned in the 1790s to link the rivers Severn, Mersey and Dee, providing a trunk route for the north-west's coal and iron industries, and to transport limestone from quarries to limekilns along the route, which provided fertiliser for farmland.

Then, as now (seemingly), infrastructure projects were hampered by financial problems and not all the planned route was actually built. However, the parts that *were* opened achieved their aim of serving the coal, iron and limestone industries of the north-west before the railways made them largely redundant in the 1850s.



But the Llangollen Canal is more famous for its engineering, an

achievement we can appreciate today. The canal had to traverse difficult territory, including crossing two river valleys: Chief Engineer Thomas Telford was a pioneer and his greatest achievement, the Pont-cy-syllte Aqueduct, (I had to look up the spelling...) is rightly regarded as one of engineering's 'Wonders of the World'. Taking ten years to build, the aqueduct took the canal across the Dee Valley – 130 feet above the valley floor - and opened in 1805. It is sometimes known as "the river in the sky".

That's enough history stuff! Our canal trip included crossing the famous aqueduct:



The sun was shining as we arrived at the canal wharf and, courtesy of "Jones the Boats", boarded the narrow boat for our trip. Threading out through a cluster of boats (is there a collective noun for narrow-boats?), we crossed the aqueduct. I can tell you that the view is fantastic, that the river in the valley is a long way below, and that the aqueduct is very narrow, with a footpath – originally a towpath for the horses – on one side only. Later, as we returned over the aqueduct, I had some sympathy with a lady who had been walking along the towpath across the aqueduct but was now standing and gripping the railings with white knuckles. I think I would have stayed on land.

We returned to Pulford via a scenic drive – and the scenery was magnificent – for (another) drinks reception and formal dinner.

Once again, our organising team and the Grosvenor staff had done an excellent job and we were well fed (and wined).

To mark the occasion of our 40th anniversary, RSA President Bob Coles gave a short talk outlining the RSA's development and some of the key characters who had been involved along the way. He'd obviously done lots of homework, because his speech was enlightening as well as amusing. Thankyou Bob. **Cont'd page 4**

He was given a small sum to cover his expenses in coming to talk to us, which he promptly said he would give to the Trust. The bad weather in early March sounded alarm bells for the AGM. Accordingly, the March meeting was cancelled. For nearly a century a postal railway network operated 21 metres below the streets of the city. On arrival at 11 a.m.we can tour the museum Gallery and Mail Rail Exhibition. We can then embark upon a specially made train to take a short journey through the original tunnels and platforms under Mount Pleasant. We will lunch at a suitable

Membership Update Ian Johnson, Membership Secretary

In the last year there have been some changes and updates to the membership criteria. This article is to bring you up to date with these changes and perhaps remind you of the need to keep the me up to date with any changes to your address or other contact details. If you can't remember if you've already let me know, I'm more than happy to hear from you again. I also need to explode some assumptions about what I receive.

Four major updates this year have been approved by the Central Committee.

- <u>'Retired' in the organisation's name means anyone who has left CAA or NATS</u> whether retiring, going to another job or for any other reason. You can be any age all you need to do is pay your subs and want to keep in touch.
- You do not need a CAAPS pension to be a member. You can set up a Standing Order from your bank to pay the £1 per month. We will accept a cheque, but it is getting more difficult to get to banks to pay them in. If you pay this way, please consider switching to a standing order. Many new joiners without pensions, or by preference, are using this new method.
- <u>The Travel Club discounts are a benefit to all our members</u> and you are all members. New discounts are regularly added so keep in touch with updates in Contrail and on the CAA-RSA Website.
- <u>If you stop paying your subs, then you are resigning from the organisation</u>. Long term members who joined in the legacy life system do not have to pay subs unless they wish to do so. Switching back to non-paying is the same as resigning.

What's happened this year:

- We now have 5022 members a net reduction of 78 over the year. About 60% pay subscriptions.
- Partners and anyone with a connection to CAA & NATS have always been welcome to join and we have updated our documentation to make this clearer
- The Central Committee have closed 4 Branches. Eastern Branch and Western Home Counties Branch members were transferred to the London and Home Counties (LHC) Branch. Highlands and Islands Branch and West of Scotland Branch were subsumed into the Edinburgh Branch.
- We have done lots of work to get our membership database and other records as up to date and secure as possible. Most is held electronically. Due to new Guidelines coming into force in May under the Data Protection Act, you should read the Data Protection article in this issue on what data we hold and what we do with it. This is important.

To correct, however, some misunderstandings:

- If you let Pensions know your new address and email, they <u>do not</u> tell me. If Contrail stops coming you have not let me know any new address or email! Please let <u>me</u> know when these change, not the Contrail Editor or Webmaster. The fact that you are seeing this means that you currently have an up to date address or email in our records! However, every time we send out Contrail I have returned copies or emails because you've moved or changed these details without telling me. Others may not be returned but simply binned.
- We get no financial help from CAA or NATS. It's only the contributing members that pay the running costs.
- Subscribers get 4 Contrail issues per year. Non-paying members get the June issue only.

We value your membership and hope that you get benefits from it. We are always looking for help to run the organisation. If you can spare a few hours a month, please get in touch with any member of the Central Committee to discuss the options.

Data Protection

Ian Johnson, Membership Secretary

You may not be aware that new Data Protection guidelines came into force in May to protect you from data misuse. Essentially this means that newer members have to opt in to their data being stored electronically, all members must be able to see what we hold on themselves on request and ask for it to be deleted. Please note however that we do not have a manual system for recording your membership so deletion has to be treated as a resignation. So the answers to a few questions to explain:

What Data do we hold?

From Autumn 2016 the Membership Secretary holds an image of all new application forms and all the data you gave on it is held in a password protected electronic database. Members joining before this date have the same information in the database, but no application form image was stored. Except for an off-site backup with the Webmaster, only the Mem Sec has access to this database of your information.

Who else sees any of this data?

• Your contact details only (membership number, type of member, name and title, postal address, telephone No. (not ex directory) and email (where available and the date of joining, leaving and date of any change is also included.) are shared twice yearly with your Branch Secretary for their communications to you.

• Where you ask for a postal Contrail your name and address is provided to the printers for distribution, e-mail Contrail recipients have their email address provided to the Webmaster for that distribution.

• Name and address details are also given to the Webmaster to enable identification should the email with the link to Contrail bounce. The Webmaster uses an external company to distribute the Contrail, but only the name, email address and RSA reference number are held on that distribution database. **Cont'd page 13**

Data Protection Cont'd.

Why do we need this data?

Only for communication and record purposes. Your data is not shared with any marketing or commercial companies except for Contrail distribution as described above.

How secure is it?

The Data is held in a password protected Excel spreadsheet on a personal computer, the images and electronic copies of letters are on an external data stick so protected from any hacking. One of the provisions of the new Guidelines is that the software and data protection software must be kept up to date. The Excel database uses the latest MS Office version regularly updated. Two forms of the latest virus and hacking software is also used to protect your data.

Can I see what data you hold?

Yes. You can ask me at any time to print out and send you your data record. I will correct then any errors if your data has changed but we've not yet been informed. All changes in your information that you tell me about are corrected on the database as soon as possible.

Did I agree to this electronic data record and can you delete it?

Newer members since mid-2017 have signed the statement opting in as part of their application form. Older members do not have to retrospectively be asked to do so. However, any member can ask the Mem Sec to delete their data record at any time, but as stated we don't have a manual system for recording members so that will be a resignation from the RSA. **Any questions on this can be sent to the membership Secretary at the usual address or email in Contrail.**


